This letter was endorsed "Via Southampton" and the correct rate of 21¢ was prepaid. However, the P. & O. Line steamer <u>Surat</u> had departed from Southampton on December 2, so this letter missed her sailing. Rather than hold up the mail, the India mails were sent




March 25, 1891. A mourning letter posted at Delhi, India and paid 2 annas 6 pies by the Empire Issue of 1882. The January 1889 rate to the U.S. by British Mail was 3 a., Mence this letter was underpaid by 6 pies ($\frac{1}{2}$ anna). This was

equivalent to about 6 centimes, shown by the manuscript "D 6cts."

March 27-28. Transit backstamps at Bombay and routing aboard the Sea Post Office at Bombay. The S.S. Bengal of the P. & O. Line departed from Bombay on March 28 and arrived at Brindisi, Italy, via Suez Canal, on April 13.

April 15. R.M.S. Gallia, Cunard Line, departed from Queenstown with the U.S. Mails.





COLLECT 3 CENTS

April 24. Gallia arrived at N.Y. As 5 centimes = 1¢ U.S. the 6 centimes underpayment was slightly over 1¢, which was doubled as a fine to over 2¢, rounded up to 3¢ due, shown by the handstamp on the letter face and the 2¢ + 1¢ Postage Due stamps on the reverse, Issue of 1891.



This cover has posed some head-scratching for me. Using Wawrukiewicz and Beecher's tables, I come up with three possible routes for this 1891 letter:

1). British Mail rate, Jan. 1881, 2 anna (25 centimes). Overpaid ½a. (6 pies). I presume this rate was superseded by the Jan. 1889, thus would not apply to this letter.

2) Jan. 1889. Br. Mail via Brindisi, $4\frac{1}{2}a$. (55 centimes). This seems the most logical route to me relative to date stamps (not to rates). If it went by this route, then underpayment was 2a. or 25 centimes. Thus, letter should show T=25 centimes (5¢) underpayment and a double deficiency of 50 cent. (10¢) collected in the U.S. A very faint 15 mark in manuscript at U.L. of the face appears (I can't make out the denominator, which would indicate 15 centimes (3¢) underpaid. This may have been erased by some misguided soul to "improve" the cover. In this case, 6¢ should have been collected.

3). Jan. 1889. The other applicable rate was Br. Mail by "other route" of 3a. (37½ centimes). This would seem to give an underpayment of only ½ anna (6 pies). At the above equivalents, this would equate to 6½ centimes, and account for what looks like D 6 cts (centimes?) in mss at the left of the stamps. If this is so, it would convert to slightly over 1¢ U.S., maybe doubled and rounded off to 3¢, thus accounting for the 3¢ in due stamps in the U.S.
