The N.Y. Shipping List shows her as scheduled to sail Sept. 8, and cleared Sept. 7 for Havre. No doubt this letter missed the sailing by one day.

Sept. 16. The <u>Packet Ship</u> <u>Ville de Lyon</u>, 791 tons, in service 1837-1845 for the Old Line, sailed on this date for Havre with this letter. Letter put directly into the letter bag aboard ship, thus no U.S. postal markings.



October 13, 1838. Letter received at Havre and handled by the Bureau Maritime. They struck it with the "Overseas countries by way of Havre" mark (Salles 86, Type III).

Letter forwarded on unpaid to Paris.

Packet Ship Francois I was ship rigged, 496 tons, 127'-3" x 29'-4" beam, launched 1828 at N.Y. by C. Bergh & Co. She served 17 years from 1828-41, but was temporarily out of service after an accident 1839-41.

Her average Westbound passage was 36 days, fastest 24 days, longest 56 days. On this 40 day voyage in 1838 she was just longer than average.

Her captain on this voyage was William W. Pell (c.1800-1884), 5'11", born N.Y. He served as captain aboard the following Havre packet ships: '31 Sully, '34 Normandie, '37 Francois I, '39 Iowa to '42.

July 17, 1838. Letter datelined at Havre by William Lee, brother of the addressee. It was handled by the Havre for-warding agent Bonnaffe Boisgerard & Co. who applied their oval backstamp in blue (RF2), and routed it "p. Francois 1st / Via New York". P.P. = Port Payee, thus forwarder paid letter to the dockside at Havre.




July 17. Transit at the Bureau Maritime, Havre. The Packet Ship Francois I was marked up in the shipping lists to clear to sail from Havre July 16. This letter passed aboard at the sailing.

The New York papers advertised that the Packet Ship <u>Iowa</u> of the Havre Old Line was scheduled to sail from Havre on the 16th of April, but the Havre postmark shows that she sailed on the 18th.
