

July 2. As Captain Harvey Mills had left the Quincy House the letter was forwarded on to him at Thomaston, Maine at no extra charge, even though five days later. BOSTON/E backstamp received the letter back into the mails.

#### R.M.S. Unicorn

This Voyage Inaugurated the Cunard Line

<u>Unicorn</u> made the first transatlantic crossing for the Cunard Line to inaugurate a feeder service between Pictou, Nova Scotia and Quebec during the months the St. Lawrence was navigable. The contract between Cunard and the British Admiralty was to commence on July 4, 1840, with the R.M.S. Britannia to call at Halifax and Boston.

R.M.S. <u>Unicorn</u> departed from Liverpool May 16, 1840, touched at Halifax on June 1, and arrived at Boston on June 3. The 640 ton wooden paddle steamer <u>Unicorn</u> had previously operated for the Burns Line between Glasgow and Liverpool.

Maiden Voyage

With the final negotiations with the British Admiralty on July 4, 1839, Samuel Cunard won the bid to provide subsidized fortnightly mail packet service by steamship between Liverpool and Boston with a side port of call at Halifax. A slight reduction in the subsidy allowed only monthly sailings between November and February. Cunard had wooden paddle steamers ready, and the <u>Britannia</u> departed from Liverpool on July 4, 1840, on the first subsidized passage.

July 18. <u>Britannia</u> had touched at Halifax on July 17 and arrived at Boston July 18. Letter rated at Boston, Act of 1825, for a single letter over 400 miles at 25¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 27¢ due, shown by the red "27".

While the Cunard Line mail was subsidized by Britain, there was no contract with the U.S., so incoming Cunard Line mail was handled in the U.S. as ordinary Ship Letters. This lasted until the U.S.-British Treaty of 1848.

#### R.M.S. Britannia

Maiden Return Voyage

On July 4, 1840, the 1135 ton wooden paddle steamer  $\underline{\text{R.M.S.}}$   $\underline{\text{Brit-}}$   $\underline{\text{annia}}$  sailed from Liverpool to inaugurate the regular British & North American Royal Mail Steam Packet Company's transatlantic service. She arrived at Boston July 18. The line was more commonly known as The Cunard Line.

N.B.: A previous westbound voyage by  $\underline{\text{R.M.S.}}$   $\underline{\text{Unicorn}}$  was to station her on the feeder service between Pictou and Quebec on the St. Lawrence River.



July 29, 1840. Letter dated at Boston. It is endorsed: <u>Britannia</u>.

August 1. <u>Britannia</u> departed from Boston for Liverpool on her maiden homeward voyage.





August 14. <u>Britannia</u> arrived at Liverpool. London mails were forwarded by rail.

August 30, 1840. Seth Sprague, Jr. correspondence datelined at London. He informs his wife he has completed a tour through Ireland and Scotland and has arrived at London. He is to get ready to embark for New York in the packet ship Roscious (Dramatic Line, Liverpool to New York - E.K. Collins,) sailing on the 13th of September. He notes, "We should have taken passage in the Steamer Britannia which sails on the 4th, but Edward does not seem ready & wishes to make a tour through Wales. We shall save 200 dollars in our passage only we shall be 10 days longer. If I had my choice I should have taken passage in the steamer, but I think there is more danger than in a Packet Ship."





September 2. Letter paid 1 shilling (1/- in red mss.) at the Charing Cross, London post office. This was the Packet Letter rate by Cunard steamer to the United States. Letter is endorsed: Per Steamer/Britannia via Liverpool/& Boston.

September 4. R.M.S. <u>Britannia</u> sailed from Liverpool for Boston on her 2nd Westbound passage.



September 18. <u>Britannia</u> arrived at Boston. Letter rated, Act of 1825, single, 30 to 80 miles at 10¢ plus 2¢ Ship Letter = 12¢. Letter had originally and erroneously rated at only 10¢.

Unicorn had gone out May 16, 1840 to go on station at British North America.



Sept. 18. Arrival of Britannia at Boston. Letter was rated at the zone rate of 18-3/4¢ (Act of March 1825) for a letter going 150 to 400 miles, Boston to N.Y. As U.S. rated per  $\frac{1}{4}$ -oz., this letter was subject to 7 rates (1-3/4 ounce) or  $18-3/4 \times 7 = 131\frac{1}{4}$  to which was added the 2¢ Ship Letter charge =  $133\frac{1}{4}¢$  due as shown in manuscript.

British and U.S. charges total \$2.294, a lot of money in 1840.

January 27, 1844. Letter from the deacons of the Second Congregational Church at Montreal to the Committee of the Colonial Missionary Society at London entreating for more funds to continue the Church and to pay the pastor, Dr. Carruthers.

February 5, 1844. Letter was carried out of the mails by favor by a passenger bound for Boston where the R.M.S. Britannia departed on Feb. 5 for Liverpool via Halifax. This was no ordinary departure as the Britannia had become frozen solid in the ice of Boston Harbor. The great esteem that the Bostonians had for the Cunard packets was demonstrated when the inhabitants themselves cut a passage way in the ice seven miles long to enable her to reach the open water. When the Company asked for a bill to be sent to it, it was told there was nothing to pay! This letter was aboard her when she went out through the ice channel.



Feb. 18, 1844. Britannia arrived at Liver-pool on Feb. 18 and the unknown benefactor of the Second Congregational Church posted the letter into the British postal system there unpaid, thus saving the expensive transatlantic postage, then at the rate of 1sh.2d. (28¢) per half ounce.





December 1. R.M.S. Britannia departed from Boston for Liverpool via Halifax.



December 16. Britannia arrived at Liverpool, letter backstamped at London in transit December 16.

The British Packet Letter rate of 1 shilling applied, shown as 1/-.

Nov. 4. Britannia departed from Liverpool this date on her 26th westbound passage to Boston.

Nov. 21. Britannia arrived at Boston Nov. 20. Letter was rated Boston to Philadelphia at the Act of March 3, 1845 rate of 10¢ for a ½-oz. letter inland going over 300 miles + 2¢ Ship Letter charge + 12¢ due, shown by the red charge mark.

This is the earliest recorded date of the Blake 294 mark.



May 2, 1846. Letter paid at Edinburgh, Scotland at the 1 shilling British Packet rate to America. Rate shown by 1/- in red manuscript.

May 4. Transit oval backstamp at Liverpool.

May 5. R.M.S. <u>Britannia</u> of the Cunard Line departed from Liverpool for Boston via Halifax.



May 21. Britannia arrived at Boston. Letter rated at the Act of 1845 rate for a letter not over 300 miles at 5¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 7¢ due.

May 22. Docket notes received at New York, this date.

#### R.M.S. Britannia

Britannia sailed to New York to check out facilities

This letter reached Boston on September 19, 1847, aboard the R.M.S. Britannia. On the same day, shortly after arrival, Britannia departed Boston and proceeded to New York, arriving on September 22. She left New York September 27, arriving back at Boston on September 30, the day before her regular departure from Boston for Liverpool. This trip was to check out the facilities at New York, soon to become a western terminus for every other Cunard voyage (Cf.: Hubbard & Winter, Pg. 23.)





August 27, 1847. A prices current from Lenerson & Co., Rotterdam and endorsed: p Britannia. It went under cover to a forwarding agent in London who paid the one shilling (1/- in red manuscript) Packet Letter rate to America.

September 4. R.M.S. Britannia departed from Liverpool for Boston via Halifax.

September 19. <u>Britannia</u> arrived at Boston. Letter rated as a Ship Letter addressed to the port of arrival at 6¢. This letter was no doubt in a bundle with others to Silas Pierce & Co., Boston with only the top letter showing the total rate for all letters.

November 18, 1847. Letter dated and posted at Manchester, England. The Packet Letter rate of one shilling to North America was paid, shown by the red 1/- in manuscript. Letter is endorsed: Per Britannia Steamer.

November 19. Transit backstamp at the Liverpool Packet Letter Office. R.M.S. Britannia, Cunard Line, sailed from Liverpool this day for Boston.



December 9. <u>Britannia</u> arrived at Boston. Letter subject to the 6¢ due rate foe a single Ship Letter addressed to the port of entry.

July 15, 1873. The Jan. 1, 1870 rate of 3d. (6¢) per ½-oz., paid by a copy of the Issue of 1873, Plate 11. Cancellation (Dubus 268) is of the Nos. 71 to 88 with date stamps. This is of the 3rd series of these numbers which may be distinguished from their predecessors by the narrow ovals, cds is large (23 mm.) and close to the oval. The bars adjacent to the top and bottom of the numeral circles have been rounded to

accommodate the circle, which is 11 mm.

The sender wished the letter to be made up in the evening mails at London to catch the Cunard Liner due to call at Queenstown the next day, so he paid a one penny Late Fee by a penny red Issue of 1864, Plate 66.

R.M.S. Calabria, Capt. McMickan, departed from Liverpool July 15 and called at Queenstown the 16th where this letter went aboard with the London and Irish mails, justifying the 1d. Late Fee.



July 27, Sunday. Calabria arrived N.Y. at the dock of Charles G. Francklyn with 59 cabin and 446 steerage passengers.
