



Letter went under separate cover to a forwarding agent at New York who made the pencil note, "75 paid Treble". This refers to the  $25^{\circ}$  per  $^{1}{2}$ -oz. freight money x 3 = 75° paid to the Great Western. Letter notes enclosures.



It was erroneously rated and paid at the 1837 Post Office Notice Packet Letter rate of 2sh2d. (2/2) for single letters from London to North america including New York and the U.S. (Tabeart Pg. 17). On March 4, 1839, this rate was reduced to 1 shilling single, including U.K. Inland, letter thus overpaid 1sh.2d.



November 11, 1839. Letter posted at Charleston, S.C. and paid at the Act of March 3, 1825, rates at 25¢ for a single letter going over 400 miles, Charleston to N.Y. It was endorsed: Great Western/par New York, indicating it was to go the England aboard the S.S. Great Western. This routing required in addition the payment of 25¢ Freight Money to the Great Western Steam Ship Company which was paid in cash to the postmaster at Charleston who forwarded the Freight Money on to New York with the letter. Hence, the "25" was written twice showing that inland 25¢ + Freight Money 25¢ had both been paid.

Nov. 15. British steamer <u>Great Western</u>, Hosken, cleared this date at New York for Bristol, England, sailed Nov. 16.

#### S.S. Great Western

12th Outbound Voyage

February 6, 1840. A duplicate letter from Baring Brothers, London. The original had gone from Liverpool by the sailing ship Oxford of the Black Ball Line.







February 19, 1840. Letter posted at London as a double PAID SHIP LETTER at 8d. x 2 = 16d. = 1sh.4d., shown as 1/4 in red manuscript. This was the standard 8d. Ship Letter rate in effect only since January 10, 1840.

February 20. S.S. Great Western departed from Bristol for New York on her 12th outbound passage.



March 7. Great Western arrived at New York, letter processed on March 8. It was rated, Act of 1825, letter conveyed 150-400 miles, New York to Boston, at the zone rate of 18=3/4¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 20-3/4¢ due, shown in manuscript While double rated in England, this letter was single rated at New York.

#### S.S. Great Western

12th Return Voyage

March 19, 1840. Letter datelined at New York. The Great Western was, in 1840, entering her thank season of transatlantic voyages. This was her 1st return voyage of the season, having left Bristol on February 20, arriving New York March 7,8. The letter went directly into the Letter Bag of the Great Western. She sailed for Bristol on March 19.



### BRISTOL SHIP LETTER



April 4, 1840. Great Western arrived at Bristol where the BRISTOL/SHIP LETTER mark was struck. A collect rate of 8 pence, standard after 1840, was due.

April 5. Arrival backstamp at Edinburgh.

Letter content tells of mails via British Queen and Great Western, also a great fête to be held at Niblo's Saloon in New York featuring a whole ox with gilded horns to be roasted whole with gas, and a 1000 lb. Wedding Cake, all in honor of Queen Victoria's marriage. Widows and orphans of British origin were to enjoy the feast.

## THE GREAT WESTERN STEAM SHIP COMPANY S.S. Great Western 13th Outbound Passage

April 13, 1840. A letter on the letterhead of the Transatlantic Steam Ship Company at Liverpool discusses the disappointment of the investors in the Company, whose sole vessel was the S.S. Liverpool. They had the S.S. United States under construction, as mentioned in the letter, but this was sold to the Peninsular & Oriental Line as S.S. Oriental. The Liverpool was also sold to P. & O. in 1840 and became the Great Liverpool. The writer of this letter, J. Carlton, hoped for a subsidy for the Liverpool for carrying the India mails to Alexandria, Egypt, the overland route, but this never materialized. Transatlantic Steam Ship Co. went out of business in 1840, unable to survive without a government mail subsidy. Letter is endorsed: per Great Western.

April 14, 1840. Letter was posted paid at Liverpool at the 8d. Ship Letter charge in effect since 1840. It was forwarded to Bristol to meet the sailing of the <a href="Message">Great</a> Western.


April 15. S.S. Great Western sailed from Bristol on her 13th outbound passage.

May 3. Great Western arrived at New York. Letter there rated at 6¢ for a single Ship Letter addressed to the port of arrival. A docket also notes received at New York on May 3.

April 14, 1840. A letter from Baring Bros. & Co. at London acknow-ledging receipt of drafts from Messrs. Magoun & Son of Boston as debits, also crediting their account for £2400 received from Capt. Winsor of the ship Pharsalea. Letter is endorsed: p. Gt. Western via Bristol.





April 14. Letter posted at the Lombard Street (L.S.) post office, London. It was paid at the 8d. Ship Letter rate in effect since January 10, 1840.

Letter went in transit at London as a PAID SHIP LETTER. It was forwarded by rail to Bristol

April 15. S.S. Great Western departed from Bristol for New York on her 13th outbound passage.



May 3. Great Western arrived at New York. Letter was there rated at the Act of 1825, single letter conveyed 150-400 miles at 18-3/4¢ plus 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 20-3/4¢ due, shown in manuscript.

June 19. <u>Great Western</u> arrived at New York. Letter rated, Act of 1835, as a letter conveyed 150-400 miles, New York to Boston, at 18-3/4¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 20-3/4¢ due, shown in manuscript.



May 9, 1840. This letter was handled by the forwarding agent G.W. Schmidt & Co., New York, who arranged for the letter to be carried "by favor" by a passenger on the Great Western,

Capt. Hosken, which sailed this date for Bristol. Forwarding agent struck their cachet as a backstamp (R.F. 3.)

May 24. Great Western arrived at Bristol.

May 25. Letter was hand carried into London and posted unpaid at the Ludgate St.Penny Post Receiving House; 2 pence charge mark.
"By favor" saved the 25¢ Freight money (paid to the Great Western) plus the 8d. (16¢)

PAID AT LIVERPOOL June 2, 1840. Letter dated at Adelphi House, Liverpool and paid at the 8d. single Ship Letter rate in effect in Britain after 1840. Letter is endorsed:pr. Great Western via Bristol. Liver-

pool receiving backstamp.

This letter is a companion to one written June 3 and directed: pr Ship Congaree. This Great Western letter arrived at New York on June 18 in 16 days. The letter per Congaree didn't arrive at Boston until July 24, a passage of 50 days. (See Congaree letter also in this collection - Boston Ship Letters.)

June 4. S.S. Great Western departed from Bristol.



June 19. Great Western had arrived at New York on June 18. Letter rated, Act of March 3, 1825, single letter 150 to 400 miles, N.Y. to Duxbury, Mass., at 18-3/4¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 20-3/4 ¢ due.

14th Return Voyage

June 18, 1840. A duplicate letter, the original of which went to London from New York by the sailing packet  $\underline{\text{England}}$  of the Liverpool Black Ball Line .

June 19. Letter notes <u>inter alia</u>, "The 'Great Western' has just delivered her letters and we have the pleasure to own receipt of yours..."

This notation agrees with the recorded arrival date of <u>Great Western</u> at New York on June 18, 1840.

July 1. A return letter to Messrs. Fred Huth & Co. at London, endorsed: pr. Gt. Western. The <u>Great Western</u> sailed this date from New York for Bristol on her 14th homeward passage.

July 15. Great Western arrived at Bristol.

July 16. London arrival backstamp. Letter rated at 8d. due, the standard British Ship Letter rate in effect since January 10, 1840.

July 25. Letter forwarded by rail to Bristol to meet the July 25th sailing of  $\underline{\text{S.S.}}$   $\underline{\text{Great}}$   $\underline{\text{Western}}$  from that port.



August 9. Great Western arrived at New York. Letter was there rated for U.S. charges at, Act of 1825, letter conveyed over 400 miles, N.Y. to Robbinston, Maine at  $25 \pm 2 \pm 2 \pm 100$  key Letter charge =  $27 \pm 100$  key and in manuscript.

August 12 (cm.) Letter entered New Brunswick at the Exchange Office at St. Andrews. New Brunswick rate shown in manuscript:

27¢ U.S. in currency = Sp  $1N4\frac{1}{2}$ St. Andrews to St. John  $\frac{9}{2N1\frac{1}{2}}$ 

The British North American colonies represented a shilling as "N", thus amount due in currency was 2 shillings  $1\frac{1}{2}$ pence.

July 24, 1840. A letter paid at Liver-pool at the 8d. Ship Letter rate in effect starting in 1840. This was the single rate, under ½-oz. and put the letter aboard the steamship. The cover is endorsed: p. Great Western/ from Bristol.

July 25. This letter went by rail to Bristol where the <u>S.S.</u> <u>Great Western</u> departed for New York on her 15th outward bound passage.

August 9. Great Western arrived at New York, transit handstamp. Letter was rated, Act of 1825, for a letter conveyed 150 to 400 miles, N.Y. to the Canadian border at  $18-3/44 \times 2$  (double letter) =  $37\frac{1}{2}4 + 24 \times 10^{-2}$  Ship letter charge =  $39\frac{1}{2}4 + 24 \times 10^{-2}$  due.

In Canada the U.S. charge was converted to  $1 \, \mathrm{sh.8 \frac{1}{2} d.}$  Canadian currency. To this was added the Canadian inland charge of  $6 \, \mathrm{\frac{1}{2} d.}$  (60 to 100 miles) x 2 =  $1 \, \mathrm{sh.1 d.}$  The total due of  $2 \, \mathrm{sh.9 \frac{1}{2} d.}$  is shown in manuscript as  $2/9 \, \mathrm{\frac{1}{2}.}$



July 24, 1840. A letter paid at Liverpool at the 8d. Ship Letter rate in effect starting in 1840. It is noted on the face at upper left "under ½ oz." to note that it was subject to the single 8d. Ship Letter rate. The cover is endorsed: p. Gt. Western via Bristol.

July 25. The letter went by rail to Bristol where the  $\underline{\text{S.S.}}$   $\underline{\text{Great}}$   $\underline{\text{Western}}$  departed for New York on her 15th outward bound passage.



#### S.S. Great Western

July 24, 1840. Letter datelined at London (7th Mo. 24, 1840) and directionally endorsed "per Great Western."

This letter was bundled with others into a packet for the Great Western, hence bears no British postal markings which would appear on the covering wrapper. This letter is No. 4 as noted on the face, and letter No. 5 of the same correspondence and on the same crossing of the Great Western is in this collection.

July 25. Great Western, Capt. Hosken, departed from Bristol for New York on this date.





August 9. Great Western arrived at New York on this date. Letter rated Act of March 3, 1825, single, 80 to 150 miles at 12½¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 14½¢ due as noted in manuscript.

the last one noting, "I have no time before the mail closes to read over my letter....."

This is numbered on face "No. 5" and was made up in a packet to the <u>Great Western</u>, Capt. Hoskin, thus bears no British postal markings, all of which would appear on the outer wrapper. (See letter No. 4 of the same correspondence, same <u>Great Western</u> sailing.)

July 25. The S.S. Great Western, Capt. Hosken, departed from Bristol this date for New York.



August 9, 1840. Arrival date of the Great Western at New York. Letter was rated single under Act of March 3, 1825, going 80 to 150 miles, N.Y. to Philadelphia, at 12½¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 14½¢ due as shown in manuscritp.


#### S. S. Great Western

15th Return Passage

August 13 and 14, 1840. A letter headed at Cabotville (the former name of Chicopee, Mass.) from James Tyler Ames to his brother Nathan Peabody Ames (1803-1847), partners in the foremost American sword manufactory, Ames Manufacturing Co. They also had a bronze cannon foundry. Nathan was in Europe in 1840 for the U.S. Government to inspect various armories to obtain details of approved practices of manufacture. This letter discusses various points and problems attendant to the arms manufacturing business at Cabotville, site of their factory. The letter makes frequent mention of the new steamship services available for rapid communication. Besides Great Western James mentions the British Queen and Liverpool.

Letter endorsed: <u>Via</u> Great Western. It was sent in a packet by way of the Ames' N.Y. agents Young, Smith & Co. who acted as forwarding agents, thus this letter bears no U.S. postal markings. The agent paid the freight money and handed the letter directly of the <u>Great Western</u>'s purser.

August 18. S.S. Great Western departed from New York on her 15th return voyage.





September 1. Great Western arrived at Bristol, received as a Ship Letter. Rated at the 8d. standard Ship Letter rate of 1840. This is a late usage of the stepped BRISTOL/SHIP LETTER handstamp in red.

September 2. London arrival backstamp.

16th Outbound Passage







September 11, 1840. Letter dated at Liverpool and endorsed: p Gt. Western/ via Bristol. It was paid at the 8d. British Ship Letter rate in effect in 1840.

September 12. S.S. Great Western departed from Bristol on her 16th outbound passage.



September 27. Great Western arrived at New York, letter processed on September 28. It was rated under the U.S. Act of 1825 for a single letter conveyed 150-400 miles, N.Y. to Richmond, Virginia, at 18-3/4¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 20-3/4¢ due.

#### S.S. Great Western

The Great Western was put under a financial strain by the Bristol Docks Company, which insisted on levying heavy dockage dues. This was despite the fact that Great Western's large size compelled her to moor at Kingroad, where she loaded her cargo from and into lighters. In 1842 she sailed alternately from Bristol and Liverpool, finally only L'pool in 1843.



Nov. 6, 1840. Letter posted at L'pool as a paid Ship Letter, directionally endorsed "Pr Gt. Western/via Bristol". It was rated as a double letter, Inland postage (Act of 1812), Liverpool to Bristol (via London), 328 miles, at 2sh.2d. for a letter going 300-400 miles plus 6d. Ship Letter charge = 2sh.8d. as shown by 2/8 in red.

Nov. 7. Great Western sailed for New York.

Nov. 24. British steamer Great Western, Hosken master, arrived at N.Y. Rated as 6¢ due for a Ship Letter addressed to the port of arrival.

Ship Letter, eff Jan 10,18 for 8d. 8dx 4=32d=284.8d.

#### S.S. Great Western

17th Return Voyage

December 8, 1840. Letter docketed at New York at the offices of Goodhue & Co., shippers and merchants and forwarding agents. Letter went directly to the <u>Great Western</u> as endorsed by their courier, thus avoiding and U.S. postal charges. Goodhue & Co. no doubt paid the 25¢ freight money on an account basis.

Great Western departed on December 8 for Bristol on her 17th return voyage.



BRISTOL SHIP LETTER



December 23, 1840. Great Western arrived at Bristol. Mails were forwarded by rail to London where this letter received the transit backstamp on December 25.

Letter rated 8 pence, the standard Ship Letter rate after January 10, 1840.

BRISTOL/SHIP LETTER, Robertson S.8. Found used in black 1833-1844, red 1840-41.

#### S.S. Great Western

17th Return Passage

December 1, 1840. This letter is endorsed: Per British Queen of 1st December 1840. However, it was handled too late for the sailing of the British Queen, which indeed departed from New York for London via Portsmouth on December 1.

December 8. Letter was held for the next steamer for Britain, which was the <u>S.S. Great Western</u>. She sailed from New York December 8 for Bristol, England on her 17th return voyage.



### BRISTOL SHIP LETTER

December 23. <u>Great Western</u> arrived at Bristol where the SHIP LETTER handstamp was struck. Coincidentally, <u>British Queen arrived at Portsmouth also on December 22.</u>



December 26. Arrival backstamp at Edinburgh, which was Boxing Day.

This letter was rated at 8d. due, the Ship Letter rate effective since January 10, 1840.
