





Lippincott's Gazateer notes: Carratraca Springs, a village in Prescott co., Untario, 40 miles E. of Ottawa, on the river Ottawa. It has springs whose waters are noted for their medicinal qualities.



Letter went by favor to New York care of the forwarding agents Barrell & Mather who forwarded it on in a packet (or ex-post office) to Isaiah Townsend at Albany. Their 43 mm. oval handstamp is not listed in Rowe.



April 18, 1846. Docket note in letter indicates Gisbone & Co., Calcutta, handed this letter to a ship captain at Calcutta. The captain delivered this to Forwarding Agent J. Balestier at Singapore who noted receipt a forwarded letter onward by normal mail channels.

Manuscript note says,

Rec'd Singapore 4 May 1846 & forwarded by Y.O.S. (your obedient servant) J. Balestier.

Literature (Rowe, K., <u>The Forwarding Agents</u>, 1966) notes J. Balestier oval stamps in use 1836-39. This mms. note shows this agent was still in business in 1846.

April 7. The New York Exchange Office marked the letter, which contained enclosures, with a triple debit to France for 3¢ U.S. Inland x 3 = 9¢ as shown in the N.Y. mark. The April 1, 1857 Franco-American Postal Convention rates of 15¢ per ±-oz. or 7½ grams was divided 12¢ Sea and French and 3¢ U.S. postage. Letter was forwarded on to Boston where the R.M.S. Europa departed







November 10. R.M.S. Caledonia of the Cunard Line sailed from Liverpool on her last westbound voyage for Cunard, returning to Liverpool from Boston December 5. In 1850 she was sold to the Spanish Navy, and in 1851 was wrecked near Havana.

November 29. $\underline{\text{Caledonia}}$ arrived at Boston where 24¢ was due from the recipient.

September 29. The forwarding agent Geo. Peabody & Co. deleted their address, struck their blue backstamp, and forwarded the letter to another forwarder, John Munroe & Co., Paris, who acted as poste restante (general delivery.) Peobody & Co.

paid the 4d. rate to Frence in cash, amount shown in red manuscript. Letter went back into the post at Lombard Street.



The Dresden city forwarding was handled post free.
