## SHIP LETTERS COVE

## MONTEVIDEO TO LONDON VIA COVE, IRELAND Ship Favourite

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February 26, 1836. Letter datelined at Montevideo. It also contains a triplicate Jan. 22, 1836, letter, original via Buenos Ayres, duplicate per Trevor. This letter was handed to the captain of the Favourite, a private trader.

## COVE SHIP·LETTER

London Sun, Monday June 13, 1836. SHIPPING (THIS DAY). Cork, June 10.- Arrived the Favourite, Christie, from Monte Video.

June 9-10. Cove and Dublin transit handstamps. Cove was renamed Queenstown in 1846. Robertson S.2 Cove Ship Letter mark.

June 12. Sunday "S" arrival stamp at London.

## DOVER SHIPLRE

This letter was delivered to the hand of the ship's master (Capt'n Willet of the "Harmony" as noted in manuscript,) who then passed it to Postal Authorities on arrival at Dover, England where he received 2 d. for the service.

This "DOVER SHIP LRE" mark merely indicates the cover so received at Dover.



June 23, 1788. Letter was duly forwarded to London where it received this postmark of the General Post, showing cover was unpaid and rate of 5 d. added in script to be paid by the recipient, being figured as 2 d. for carriage into London, 1 d. for the London Penny Post, and the ship master's tuppence.

## VALPARAISO, CHILE TO HOLLAND VIA ENGLAND SHIP LETTER / DOVER <u>Ship Kent</u>

August 27, 1829. Duplicate letter datelined at Valparaiso concerns the shipment of Dutch gin to Lima and the lack of sales of the same.

Letter endorsed: pr Kent, Capt. A. Cooke and addressed care of the forwarding agents Portman, Hullman & Ohrly, London.

SHIP LETTER DOVER

SHIP NEWS (London Times): January 14, 1830.

DEAL, Jan. 12. Wind E.N.E. to N.E. by E. Arrived the Kent from the South Seas.

Heavy coastal storms were reported, so the <u>Kent</u> had put into Dover a day or two earlier and her mails went ashore at Dover per the receiving Ship Letter mark. She made her final destination at nearby Deal on Jan. 12, per the Times news.

January 11. London transit backstamp confirms prior arrival at Dover.

Letter rated Dover to London, 72 miles, Act of 1812 for a letter 50 to 80 miles 8d. plus 8d. Ship Letter fee = 16d. or 1sh.4d., shown as 1/4 at right.

The forwarding agents deleted their name and the ship endorsement and forwarded the letter to Shiedam, Holland. Rates to Holland were 8d. British postage plus 8d. British transit = 1sh.4d., coincidentally the same as the Ship Letter rate charged all the way from Chile. A new 1/4 was shown at left. Dutch collected an equivalent of 80 cent + 20 cent Dutch postage = 100 cent Dutch, collected on an account basis.



## SHIP LETTERS

After 1840 a flat 8d. Ship Letter rate was adopted regardless of the Port of Entry and included inland delivery. Handstamped 8d. charge marks were adopted after this period.

Letter was handed to Robert R. Hunter, U.S. Consul at Cowes, who also operated as a private forwarding agent.







## Ship Pigeon


May 4, 1804. Letter Quaker dated (5 mo. 4, 1804) at Philadelphia. It concerns the attempt "...to receive dividends on 3 pcent deferred stock in thy name on the books of the Treasury of the U.S. Loan office." They had previously written on this matter April 10, 1804. The further write, "...and have been under the necessity of sending for it to New York, where we had hop'd to procure it in time for the present conveyance the Pigeon, Capt. Collet for London, but it is necessary to have it sent to Washington for transfer..." Letter is endorsed:Pigeon. The <u>Pigeon</u> sailed from Philadelphia for London.

The <u>Pigeon</u> touched at Deal where this letter went ashore for conveyance to London by mail coach. This was not unusual as the time beating up the Thames by sail to London was longer than over the road carriage. Deal to London was 74 miles.

June 8. Letter backstamped on arrival at London. It was rated, Act of 1801, single letter inland 50 to 80 miles at 6d. + 4d. Ship Letter charge = 10d. due, shown in manuscript.

November 2, 1804. Letter datelined at Amsterdam, where it was handed to a ship's captain headed for England. Letter deals with prints and bookselling matters, plus the loss of several members of the writer's family the previous summer from "fever".



GRAVESEND Ship Letter marking applied upon arrival at that port. Robertson S2, noted in use 1803 -1805.



November 12, 1804. Unpaid mark of the General Post, transit backstamp, double rim for evening duty. Letter rated 8d. due, being that of a double letter, 15 to 30 miles, as gravesend to London is but 22 miles. No cpatain's pence charged. Act of 1801 rates.





December 2, 1801. Letter datelined at St. John, New Brunswick, and handed directly to the captain of the brig <u>Friends</u>, as endorsed: pr Brig Friends.



Letter arrived at the port of the addressee, where the mail was handed over to the postmaster at Greenock, Scotland. Here this letter was rated under 39 Geo. III, Cap. 76, effective July 12, 1799, at 4d. for a Ship Letter addressed to the port of arrival. Inward Ship Letters were charged 4d. plus inland, here no "inland" charge made. Masters to have 2d. per letter, inwards or outwards.

This handstamp unfortunately only fairly legible, as usual. Letter landed at Plymouth, England, where it received this "Downward Step" mark, Robonson S7 in red, noted as used 1835-38. August 27, 1836. Letter arrived at London. Rated at 1sh.7d.,as follows: Rates by Act of 1812 Plymouth-London 215 miles 11d. Ship letter 6d. Captns pence 2d. 8. = 1/7.

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


Letter entered Britain at Portsmouth and was marked as a Ship Letter with this "large" step down mark, S. 13, recorded used in black 1815-44. June 5, 1833. Letter backstamped on arrival at London. It was there rated under Act of 1812 rates, Portsmouth to London, 72 miles, at 8d. single x 10 rates = 80d. = 6sh,8d. (mms. U.R.) + 4d. Ship Letter charge = 7/- due, shown as the large mms. numeral.

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May 2. The 10 pfennig German stamp was cancelled aboard the <u>Pfalz</u> showing the route Bremen-La Plata. Use of foreign stamps aboard a ship of the country's origin was permitted under the "Ship Letter" or "Paquebot" designations of this era.

May 2. Letter arrived at Southampton as a Ship Letter (Paquebot) (Hosking 117). No further postal charges were needed.



Letter is datelined at Oxmead, near Philadelphia, using the "Quaker" dating: 12th Mo., 1824. Endorsed on the face "p.New Jersey".

Shipping & Commercial List and New York Price Current lists the private trader the <u>Ship New Jersey</u>, Capt. Whittle, cleared Philadelphia Dec. 22, 1824 for Liverpool. Letter had been handed directly to the ship's captain, hence no U.S. Domestic postage is shown or was needed.



Upon arrival at Liverpool the letter was turned over to postal authorities who, in error, struck it with the INDIA LETTER/LIVER-POOL backstamp which would subject the letter to special concessionary rates accorded to ships of the East India Company. This was invalidated by overstamping with the correct mark SHIP LETTER/ LIVERPOOL. It was then backstamped again with the correct SHIP LETTER/LIVERPOOL handstamp.

January 19, 1825. Backstamped on arrival at London with the red circular mark of the General Post and the time red oval stamp of the Chief Office at 10 F.NOON.10 (10 A.M.). Letter was rated Liverpool to London (206 miles) under the inland rates, Act of 1812 (52 Geo. III.Cap 88) at 11 pence for a letter going 170 to 230 miles plus 8d. Ship Letter charge = 19d. or 1 shilling 7d. x 2 (double letter) = 3 shilling 2 pence shown as 3/2 on face.

Captain Frederick A. DePeyster, born c.1785, served on the <u>Columbus</u> '36 to '38.

Arrived at Deal Mildred, Jordan from Bengal. LLOYD'S REGISTER, 1798. <u>Mildred</u>, Ship, M. Jordan, commander, 400 tons, 2 decks, sheathed with copper, Moxon &c. owners, surv-eyed at London, hence to India. LONDON SHIP-LRE 8.5.8 February 5, 1799. Forwarding agent in London directed the letter on to Madeira: p Roskeld if not sailed, if sailed by the Jamaica. Shilling Ship Letter rate paid and Robertson S.3 LONDON/SHIP-IRE struck on face. This mark used 1786-99. LLOYD'S LIST of April 23, 1799 notes, "Arrived at Madeira, Jamaica, Sherry, London."

This strike is of the scarce variety. 4mm. Gmm. S.8 (above on cover) S.7 Jan. 27, 1800. Letter datelined at Leeds, where it was noted 11 (oz.) in upper left, which required 5 rates at one rate per 1-oz. Rated Act of 1796 (37 Geo. III.Cap 18), Leeds to London (191 miles) at 8d. per 1-oz. for a letter going over 150 miles x 5 rates = 40d. or 3sh.4d. To this was added the Captain's gratuity of 2d. x 5 = 10d. for a total of 4sh.2d. shown as 4/2 in red manuscript. Endorsed "p the Thos.Russell", the letter went directly to the addressee at Boston, thus no U.S. postal marks.



An entire letter headed. "Frolien & Bothe, Rio de Janeiro, 15th Novi 1820 " carried by private ship to London, endorsed.' Pr. Nile', arrived 5. Feby 1821. Handed in by ship's captain at London post office where the unframed 'Ship Letter London' datestamp was applied (Robertson 5.21.)





May 25, 1815. Letter prepaid as a Ship Letter at London where this "PAID" mark was struck. Robertson Type 44a with smaller letters. Letter endorsed "Brighton 7". This letter was rated under the Acts of 1799 which authorized the Post Office to accept and despatch letter by vessels other than regular Post Office packets. Outgoing letters by vessels other than packets were handled through London and were subject to half the packet rate. Here the rate to France was 1sh.2d. per  $\frac{1}{2}$ -oz. (G.P.O. Foreign Letter notice April 25, 1814. Robertson C.14/B), half being charged was 7d. per the Ship <u>Brighton</u>. Had the letter originated outside London the Inland rate to London would have been in addition to the Ship Letter Charge.

June 4, 1815. Docket notes receipt at Cognac where a French charge of 18 decimes ("18" in mss.) was due. Letter concerns an attachment on brandy for a London debtor.

#### SHIP LETTERS

By Postal Regulations, letters carried by private ship ("Ship Letters") were required to be turned over to the Postmaster at the first English port of entry where a suitable SHIP LETTER stamp was impressed, bearing the town name of the port of entry. This was vitally necessary before 1840 as the letter was rated with the Inland Rate from the port of entry plus the ship letter charge. After 1840 a flat 8d. ship letter rate applied regardless of the port of entry.

There is considerable evidence to show that after 1840, with the extension of the railways to all large ports, the more important ship letter mails were dispatched to London by train without breaking bulk at the port. The plain SHIP LETTER stamp without name of port was applied to such letters on their arrival in London (after 1840).
