
S.S. Manhattan

First Guion Voyage under U. S. Mail Contract, 64 rate

This letter was carried on the first return voyage of the S.S. Manhattan, which was also the inaugural voyage of the Liverpool & Great Western Steamship Company Limited (more popularly known as the Guion Line,) under the January 1, 1870 mail contract. While the Guion Line, British owned, began operations in August 1866, it did not at first carry contract mail. Effective January 1, 1870, the U.S.-British rate was reduced from 12¢ to 6¢, compensation of this amount was for the steamship companies. HAPAG, Cunard, North German Lloyd and Inman Lines, previous contract carriers, declined to carry mails under the new, reduced rates. Forced with a serious disruption of the U.S. mail service to Britain, the U.S. Postmaster General speedily concluded new arrangements for a weekly mail to be carried by the Guion Line to England. The initial contract was for two years. Guion Line steamships were not under contract to carry mails for the British Government to New York at any time during this period.

The Guion Line was formed as a result of the appointment of Stephen Barker Guion as agent for the Cunard Line's steerage passanger business in 1863. They were made agents for the passanger and freight business for a new line of steamers between Liverpool and New York, shortly to be reconstituted as the National Line, although usually referred to as the Guion & Co's Line. These activities continued until 1866 when he formed a North Atlantic steamship company known as the Liverpool & Great Western Steamship Company Limited, and ordered four iron screw steamers of 2869 tons and upwards from Palmers on Tyneside. The Company was invariably known as the GUION LINE.











Jan. 29, 1872. Letter paid at the Jan. 1, 1870 rate to England at 6¢ per ½-oz. Letter transit at Boston same day for transit to New York where the Nevada departed on Jan. 31 for Liverpool via Queenstown.







N.Y. Times: Outgoing Steamships Tuesday June 22. Alaska for Liverpool via Queenstown, mails close 6 A.M., sails 8:30 A.M.

By Cable: Queenstown, June 29. The Guion Line steamship Alaska, Capt. Murray from New-York June 22 for this port and Liverpool, arrived off Fastnet at 3 P.M. today.

One wonders if the addressee Miss Sarah T. Sands is related to the Sarah Sands for whom the pioneer steamship Sarah Sands was named. N.B.: Note that "Miss Sarah T. Sands/ Care of M" was preprinted and the rest of the address added in pen. This collection has two such envelopes. Cf. White Star Line Germanic.

August 28, 1886. A letter posted in London to the U.S. paid at the 2½d. U.P.U. rate by the Issue of 1884, cancelled by the "squared circle" cancel of the London, West Central office. The steamship Arizona, Guion Line, had departed from Liverpool on this date, touched at Queenstown the 29th where this letter went on board.

Later in service San Francisco-Japan-China. 1898 became USS Hancock, 1903-14 receiving ship at Brooklyn Navy Yard. 1917-18 North Atlantic troopship. Scrapped 1926.

 $\underline{\text{S.S.}}$ $\underline{\text{Idaho}}$ of the Guion Line departed from Liverpool this same date.



April 7. <u>Idaho</u> arrived at New York. As this consignee's letter was handled as a loose letter (rather than as contract mail) it was subject to the Ship Letter rate which was double the domestic rate, here the 2° drop letter rate x $2 = 4^{\circ}$ due.

February 19, 1872. Double rated letter (2-1-oz.) paid by a pair of the 6¢ Bank Note Issue of 1870-71 at 6¢ per 2-oz. at Gloucester, Mass. Transit same day at Boston. S.S. Idaho departed from New York Feb. 21, 1872.



March 4, 1872. Records show the <u>Idaho</u> arrived Queenstown March 3. London East Central paid mark where mail was processed the next day.

She was the pioneer of the Guion Line, 2869 tons, 335 ft. x 42'-6" beam, clipper bow, iron screw steamer, 10 knots. Launched May 15, 1866, at Palmer Bros. & Co., Jarrow-on-Tyne. Aug. 8, 1866, Maiden Voyage Liverpool-Queenstown- New York. 1874 compound engines installed by Fawcell & Preston, Liverpool, tonnage 3231. In 1875 she became the Massachusetts of the Warren Line. Aug. 15, 1902, wrecked near Cape Town.

May 20, 1872. Letter paid at Gloucester, Mass. by two 3¢ Bank Note Issue of 1870-71 stamps at the 6¢ transatlantic rate between U.S. and Britain. The <u>Manhattan</u> departed New York May 22, 1872 for Liverpool via Queenstown.



June 3, 1872. Manhattan arrived Queenstown this date at 2 p.m. Transit mark at London.

S.S. Minnesota

April 27, 1870. A consignee's letter datelined at Liverpool enclosing a Bill of Lading for 24 serons Green Jalca shipped on board the S.S. Minnesota. Letter is endorsed: Consignee p. Minnesota/s/.

April 28. S.S. Minnesota of the Guion Line departed from Liverpool; she touched at Queenstown the 29th.





May 11. Minnesota arrived at New York. This consignee's letter did not pass through the British post office, but was handed directly to the purser aboard the Minnesota. As such, it was not handled as a contract mail letter, but was treated as a Ship Letter rated at double the domestic rate. Here the 2¢ Drop Letter rate x 2 = 4¢ due.

May 6-7, 1872. Letter paid 6¢ x 2 = 12¢ double transatlantic rate between U.S. and Britain effective Jan. 1, 1870. Nice strip of four of the 3¢ Issue of 1870-71 pays rate and shows that the Gloucester "cut cork" cancel was separate from the cds. SS Minnesota departed New York May 8, 1872.



May 21, 1872. London, East Central District receipt PAID mark. Minnesota had arrived at Queenstown, Ireland May 20 at 7 p.m.

Sept. 8, 1873. Minnesota arrived at Queenstown at 8:30 a.m. this date, sufficient time for the mail to be processed through to London to receive this PAID receipt stamp the same day.

Penultimate Voyage

4321 tons, 400' x 44', iron screw steamer built by Palmer Bros. & Co., Jarrow-on-Tyne. Launched Nov. 14, 1872. June 17, 1874, sailed Liverpool-New York, but returned June 21 with machinery disabled. July 7, 1874, resumed Liverpool-Queenstown-New York. March 13, 1880 stranded on Anglesea, North Wales, refloated. 1880 scrapped at Sunderland.

This letter was carried on her next-to-last eastbound passage. Her 1880 dates were:

May 28, 1872. Letter paid at Gloucester, Massachusetts by 6¢ stamp, Bank Note Issue of 1870-71, which was the Jan. 1, 1870 transatlantic rate between U.S. and Britain.

The S.S. Wisconsin of the Guion Line departed New York May 29, 1872 for Liverpool via Queenstown, Ireland.



June 10, 1872. The <u>Wisconsin</u> had arrived at Queenstown June 8 at 6 p.m. As June 9th was a Sunday, letter was not stamped incoming at London until Monday June 10.

November 7. N.Y. <u>Times</u>: Arrived Nov. 7 Steam-ship Wyoming (Br.), Liverpool Oct. 27 and Queenstown 28th to Williams & Guion. Nov. 3 lat 46 15 lon 49 30 passed vessel Sarpedon, dismasted and abandoned.
