Holograph Letter by Jonothan Hastings, 1st U.S. Boston Postmaster

March 12, 1799. A letter written by Jonathan Hastings to Springfield, Mass. looking for aid in the sale of his "Township No. 3 in the 7th Range in the County of Lincoln, above Waldo's Patent". This area was in Massachusetts, District of Maine, and became what is now Milo, Maine. He is asking 60¢ per acre for 7000 acres! He notes that the Township contains "hard wood in abundance and Pines for masts and lumber."

Jonathan Hastings was postmaster at Boston from 1776 to 1803. He was thus postmaster when Massachusetts became a state of February 6, 1788.

March 13, 1799. Boston postmarks including the seldom seen "Free" handstamp, franking Hastings' letter as postmaster. The "Free Jon Hastings" manuscript marking is also listed in Blake & Davis as 231 (var.)

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
March 20, 1844. Letter datelined at Gibraltar concerns sales and market for tobacco. Included is a prices current list. Cover is endorsed: p "Ganges" via Boston.



Boston Courier, Monday, April 29, 1844. MARINE JOURNAL. PORT OF BOSTON. ARRIVED Saturday, April 27. Bark Canges, Pearson, Palermo 4th, Gibraltar 30th ult.

This letter when received at Boston was initially rated at $39\frac{1}{2}$ ¢, being, Act of 1825, as a double letter conveyed 150 to 400 miles at 18-3/4¢ x 2 = $37\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = $39\frac{1}{2}$ ¢. This Boston rate mark shows a complete outer circle. Blake's 296 shows a broken rim, record dates Jan. 31, 1843 to 1845.

A rating error was noted and the rate corrected to a single letter over 400 miles at 25¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 27¢. The $39\frac{1}{2}$ was deleted by striking over with the circular 27, which was struck again above. The 26mm. encircled "27" charge mark is not listed in Blake and this is the recording cover.

July 3, 1844. Letter posted paid at Liverpool at the one shilling packet letter rate, shown by the 1/- handstamp in red. It is endorsed: <u>p. Hibernia</u> via Halifax & Boston.

July 4. <u>R.M.S. Hibernia</u> of the Cunard Line departed from Liverpool for Boston via Halifax, as endorsed.





July 17. <u>Hibernia</u> arrived at Boston where this letter was rated, Act of 1825, over 400 miles, Boston to Canandaigua, N.Y. at 25¢ plus the 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 27¢ due.

The 26mm. encircled "27" charge mark is not listed by Blake. This strike shows rim damage from 11 to 3 o'clock, not apparent on an earlier strike of April 27, 1844.



February 3, 1845. A letter headed at Inskes House, Inverness, Scotland. It was paid one shilling (1/- in red manuscript) for the Packet Letter rate to America and endorsed: ViâHalifax. The boxed Inverness receiving stamp was struck the same day.

February 5. Letter in transit at Edinburgh as PAID.

February 7. Packet Letter Office transit backstamp at Liverpool. In 1845 the Cunard Line made only monthly sailings from Liverpool in the winter months December through March inclusive. The <u>R.M.S. Hibernia</u> had departed February 4 for Boston via Halifax, hence this letter was too late.

March 4. This letter had to wait for the March sailing of R.M.S. Cambria, which departed March 4 for Boston on her 2nd outbound passage:

Shipping and Commercial List, N.Y. Arrived at Boston March 18, steam ship Cambria, Judkins...Liverpool.

Letter, processed March 19, was rated at Boston at the Act of 1825 rate, single letter over 400 miles at 25¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 27¢ due. This charge carried the letter to Detroit, docketed March 27.

This late usage of the charge "27" mark (not listed in Blake) shows a strange distortion 6 to 8 o'clock as well as some previously noted rim distortion at upper right.

March 1, 1845. A letter paid in cash at the London Plumstead receiving house at 1 shilling packet letter rate to U.S. plus 2d. Two Penny Post charge, total 1sh.2d., shown as 1/2 in red. Transit at the London Chief Office shown by the double rim tombstone mark.

March 2. Liverpool oval transit mark. The letter went aboard the <u>R.M.S. Cambria</u> of the Cunard Line, which left Liverpool March 4 for Boston.



March 18. <u>Cambria</u> landed at Boston where the poorly struck BOSTON/SHIP mark was applied. Letter rated, Act of 1825, for a letter 150 to 400 miles at $18-3/44 \times 2$ (reweighed in the U.S. as a double letter) = $37\frac{1}{2}4 + 24$ Ship Letter charge = $39\frac{1}{2}4$ due.


This 27 mm. strike of the 39½ charge mark shows a nearly complete circle. Blake shows a much broken rim (illustrated above at right). He notes usage from June 3, 1843 to 1845. Here at least to March 18, 1845.

August 4, 1843. Letter paid in cash at Liverpool at one shilling, the packet rate to the U.S., shown as 1/- in red manuscript. It is endorsed: Hibernia. The <u>R.M.S. Hibernia</u> of the Cunard Line departed from Liverpool this day for Boston via Halifax.





August 17. <u>Hibernia</u> arrived at Boston. Letter processed August 18. It was rated as a single letter 150 to 400 miles at 18-3/44 + 24 Ship Letter charge = 20-3/44 due shown by the Boston charge mark. Blake lists this with a complete circle, here only some vestiges of the rim. B.297 noted used August 3, 1843 to July 2, 1845. This early usage here strangely has the broken rim, usually found in such cases in late usage as the rim breaks down. Both this sample and the B.297 illustrated in Blake have 11 mm. high numerals.

Penultimate Voyage of the <u>Columbia</u>

This March 4, 1843 Westbound passage was the next-to-last voyage for <u>Columbia</u>. On her last voyage she left Boston July 1, 18'3 and ran aground in fog on July 2 at Black Ledge near Seal Island, Nova Scotia. The reserve steamer <u>Margaret</u> succeeded in salvaging passengers, mails and cargo.

March 3, 1843. Letter posted at Manchester, England and paid at the one shilling packet rate (1/- in red manuscript). It is directionally endorsed: By Steamer/from/Liverpool.

March 4. <u>R.M.S.</u> <u>Columbia</u> of the Cunard Line departed from Liverpool for Boston via Halifax.

March 20. <u>Columbia</u> arrived at Boston. Letter rated single, Act of 1825, 150 to 400 miles at 18-3/44 + 24 Ship Letter charge = 20-3/44 due, shown by the small 20^3 Boston charge mark. Blake shows this in use from January 18, 1843 to 1844.

This cover was carried on the last, and westbound, voyage of <u>Columbia</u>. She left Liverpool June 4, 1843, arrived at Boston June 18. She left Boston on July 1 on the return voyage and ran aground in fog on July 2 at Black Ledge near Seal Island, Nova Scotia. Cunard's reserve steamer, the <u>Margaret</u>, set out at once from Halifax for the scene of the wreck with Samuel Cunard aboard. They succeeded in salvaging not only the passengers and mails, which continued to England aboard the <u>Margaret</u>, but also the cargo and movable parts of the ship (Cf; Hubbard & Winter).

May 26, 1843. Letter posted at the Islington Back Road receiving office, London (backstamp). Paid one shilling, the packet letter rate, shown by the neatly penned "1.0". Transit at London shown by the PAID "tombstone" mark.

May 27. Transit at the Liverpool Packet Letter Office. <u>R.M.S.</u> <u>Col</u>umbia sailed from Liverpool on June 4 on her last outbound passage.

> June 18. <u>Columbia</u> arrived at Boston. Letter rated, Act of 1825, single, 150 to 4000 miles at 18-3/4¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 20-3/4¢ due, shown by the small 20^3 Boston charge mark.

June 17, 1843. London receiving "tombstone" mark, double frame for evening duty. The letter was posted at the Lombard Street (L.S.) office and paid two shillings in cash for a double letter. Letter noted:p. Steamer via Halifax.

June 18. Transit oval at Liverpool. <u>R.M.S.</u> <u>Hibernia</u> of the Cunard Line sailed from Liverpool for Boston on June 20.




July 3. Hibernia arrived at Boston via Halifax July 1. Letter was first marked with the handstamp in red " $39\frac{1}{2}$ ". This was the Act of 1825 rate for a letter conveyed 150 to 400 miles at $18-3/44 \times 2$ (double letter) = $37\frac{1}{2}4 + 24$ Ship Letter charge = $39\frac{1}{2}4$.

The letter was then reweighed and determined to be a quadruple letter at $18-3/44 \times 4 = 754 + 24$ Ship Letter = 774 due. The new rate was added in blue pen and the $39\frac{1}{2}$ deleted by the same pen.

The Boston 17 x 8mm. $39\frac{1}{2}$ handstamp in red is not listed by Blake & Davis. This is the recording cover.

September 16, 1843. A letter posted paid in cash at Warrington, England at one shilling, the packet letter rate, shown as 1/- in red manuscript. The Warrington receiving postmark also appears on the reverse. Letter is endorsed: p Steamer "Acadia".

This letter is an invoice for canvas shipped to New York aboard the packet ship <u>Roscious</u> of the Dramatic Line, (E.K. Collins) which sailed from Liverpool September 13.

September 19. The <u>R.M.S. Acadia</u> departed from Liverpool for Boston via Halifax.



October 3. <u>Acadia</u> arrived at Boston, letter processed October 4.

Letter rated, Act of 1825, as a single letter conveyed 150-400 miles, Boston to New York, at 18-3/4¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 20-3/4¢ due.

The due amount is shown by Blake 297 with a full outer circle, a full "3" and just a visage of the "4".

August 19, 1844. Letter dated at London. The Packet Letter rate was one shilling, which had to be prepaid as no postal treaty between Britain and the United States existed in 1844. This letter bears no indication of the prepayment, so was probably sent within a enclosing cover to Liverpool.

August 20. R.M.S. Hibernia of the Cunard Line departed from Liverpool for Boston.



September 1. <u>Hibernia</u> arrived at Boston. This letter received strikes of two different Boston Ship Letter handstamps, a rather unusual circumstance.

The letter was rated, Act of 1825, for a single letter conveyed 150-400 miles at 18-3/4¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 20-3/4¢ due. The due amount is shown by Blake 297 with a full outer circle, a full "3" and just a vestige of the "4".



February 20. <u>Cambria</u> arrived at Boston. Letter was subject to the pre-treaty rate of March 3, 1845, a letter over 300 miles at 10¢ x 2 (double letter) = 20¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 22¢ due, shown by the Boston charge mark.

December 8, 1860. An unpaid letter posted at the Packet Letter Office (P.L.O), Liverpool, backstamp. Letter is endorsed: p "Persia" via Queenstown & New York. <u>R.M.S. Persia</u> of the Cunard Line departed this same date as endorsed for New York via Queenstown. She touched at the latter port December 9. U.S. was debited with 16¢ Sea (British Packet) + 3¢ British Inland = 19¢.



December 20. <u>Persia</u> arrived at New York. The N.Y. Exchange Office marked the letter as 24¢ due, the U.S.-British Treaty of 1848 rate per $\frac{1}{2}$ -oz.

This mark is noted by Hubbard & Winter (No. 83) as used from May 20, 1852 to June 22, 1859. This example pushes the latest date used forward 18 months to Dec. 20, 1860.







August 10, 1860. An unpaid letter posted at London and endorsed: p. Arabia,

August 11. <u>R.M.S. Arabia</u>, Cunard Line, departed from Liverpool. She touched at Queenstown the 12th where this letter went on board. U.S. was debited for 16¢ Sea (British Packet) + 3¢ British Inland = 19¢.



August 22. <u>Arabia</u> arrived at Boston. The Boston Exchange Office marked the letter 24¢ due, the U.S.-British Treaty of 1848 rate per $\frac{1}{2}$ -oz. U.S. retained 5¢ U.S. Inland after remitting 19¢ to Britain.

This mark is listed by Blake & Davis as used July 31, 1857 to July 3, 1861.

May 31, 1861. An unpaid letter posted at London, backstamp. It is endorsed: "Arabia".

June 1. The <u>R.M.S.</u> <u>Arabia</u> of the Cunard Line departed from Liverpool. She touched at Queenstown on June 2 where this letter went aboard with the U.S. bound mails that had been forwarded from London. U.S. was debited for 16¢ Sea (British Packet) + 3¢ British Inland = 19¢.



June 12. <u>Arabia</u> arrived at Boston. The Boston Exchange Office marked it with 24¢ due, the U.S.-British Treaty of 1848 rate. Of this amount, the U.S. retained 5¢ U.S. Inland after remitting 19¢ to Britain, per the treaty.

This 31mm. mark is listed by Blake as used July 31, 1857 to July 3, 1861.



May 23, 1863. Letter datelined at Liverpool and endorsed: p Persia via Queenstown. The U.S.-British Treaty of 1848 rate was 24¢ per $\frac{1}{2}$ -oz. On this unpaid letter, U.S. was debited for 16¢ Sea (British Packet) + 3¢ British Inland = 19¢, shown by the handstamp. U.S. would retain 5¢ U.S. Inland. Backstamped on even date at the Liverpool Packet Letter Office (P.L.0.)

May 23. <u>R.M.S. Persia</u> of the Cunard Line departed from Liverpool for New York via Queenstown. This letter had already gone aboard <u>Persia</u> at Liverpool.

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June 3. <u>Persia</u> arrived at New York. The Boston mails went by rail to that city where they were processed on June 4, backstamp.

The Treaty rate was 24¢, the exchange amount of 19¢ was due in gold. As hard coins had disappeared from circulation by 1863, due to the Civil War, the amount to be collected was adjusted to the day's value in U.S. Notes, which were depreciated. Here a ratio of 1.375

x 24¢ = 33¢ was shown. As handstamps had not yet been prepared to show the various ratios, the Boston office used the old "33" handstamp previously used on 33¢ rated covers from the Orient..

The actual ratio for June 4 was 1.33, which would give 32¢. The earliest recorded Boston "OR U.S. NOTES" mark recorded by Blake is July 22, 1863. Starnes notes a ratio used at New York of 1.33 on May 25, 1863. Until proper handstamps could be prepared, Boston made do with existing marks.



June 2, 1863. An unpaid letter posted at Florence, Tuscany (Italy) via France to the U.S. It was subject to the January 1862 rates of 21¢ per $\frac{1}{4}$ -oz. and 42¢ per $\frac{1}{2}$ -oz. This letter, not over $\frac{1}{4}$ -oz., was marked with the French debit to the U.S. of 12¢ over the International Rate + 4¢ French Inland + 2¢ transit = 18¢, shown in manuscript.

June 5. French entry mark showing mail from Italy entering France at Lanslebourg. The small 5's show this mark was struck at Paris.

June 6. R.M.S. Scotia of the Cunard Line departed from Liverpool, picked up this letter with the European mails at Queenstown June 7.





June 16. <u>Scotia</u> arrived at New York. Mail bulked to Boston where letter received identity June 17. 21¢ was due in hard currency or 29¢ in paper notes, a depreciation ratio of 1.38. Depreciated rate shown by the bold "29".

N.B.: R.F. Winter contends this "29" is B. 557, worn down. B.556 and 557 are shown here for comparison. It is our belief that this 1863 "29" is an unlisted variety, as it does not match either previously listed 29's.

June 23, 1866. An unpaid letter posted at Liverpool and endorsed: p. Cuba viâ Queenstown. As letter was to be conveyed by British Packet, the U.S. was debited with 3¢ British Inland + 16¢ Sea = 19¢ x 2 (double letter) = 38¢, shown by the manuscript notation under the upper right postmarks. R.M.S. Cuba of the Cunard Line departed from Liverpool on this date.

July 4. Cuba arrived at Boston where the Exchange Office marked the letter as an unpaid U.S.-British Treaty of 1848 packet letter at 24¢ per $\frac{1}{2}$ -oz. x 2 = 48¢ due in coin. This was converted at the day's depreciated currency ratio of 1.50 to equal 72¢ due in U.S. NOTES (paper greenbacks).

This particular ratio to total 72¢ is not listed by Blake although many similar charge amounts are shown (B. 910 through B. 922.)

February 25, 1859. A letter from the cotton brokers Eml. Zwilchenbart & Co. at Liverpool acknowledging receipt of cotton per the <u>Texan</u> <u>Star</u>. They also make claim for false packed cotton per the <u>Henry Clarke</u> arising when the planters mixed qualities in the bales. They urge more care by the planters. The letter is endorsed: per Arabia.

February 26. Letter handed unpaid into the Packet Letter Office at Liverpool who struck their receiving date stamp on the face. These usually appear on the reverse. <u>R.M.S. Arabia</u> of the Cunard Line departed from Liverpool this date for Boston.

This was a quadruple rated letter, so the U.S. was debited with 16° Sea (British Packet) + 3° British Inland = $19^{\circ} \times 4 = 76^{\circ}$ shown in manuscript.



March 11. <u>Arabia</u> arrived at Boston where the Exchange Office struck the BR. PACKET mark March 12. Letter was charged at 24¢, the U.S.-British Treaty of 1848 rate per $\frac{1}{2}$ -oz. x 4 = 96¢. The 22 x 13 mm. "96" charge mark is not listed by Blake.

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
