This was held equivalent to 6 penny-weight (dwt.) of silver. To this was added 16 grains of silver for a Ship Letter charge, making total due 6dwt.16gr. silver, shown as 6..16.

L'ORIENT, FRANCE TO BOSTON

Ship Lively

August 10, 1790. Letter headed at L'Orient and discusses problems relevantto trade including whale oil and bone, and says <u>inter</u> <u>alia</u>, "The french Whaling Ships are coming in, two arrived here & more are daily expected, so that tho' the price of 100- is low we have no reason to regret the sale, but we should have been obliged to do worse.

"Pot & Pearl ashes still continue in the same demand as p. our last tho' we have had 200 Barrels arrived p the Lively (who takes this)..."

October 18. Lively arrived at Boston*. Letter was rated under the Congress Resolution of October 20, 1787, which reduced the 1782 rates by 25%: up to 60 miles at one pennyweight (dwt.) x 5 = 5 dwt. plus 16 grains Ship Letter charge, total 5 dwt. 16 gr. as shown in manuscript.

These straight line BOSTON marks followed by the date are seen from 1789 to 1792 in various formats.

N.B.: This cover is ex-Blake and the recording cover for B. 136-139 inclusive.

Blake rates this cover at Packet single 4 dwt. via Boston, Ship 16 gr. + 1 dwt. under 60 miles = 5 dwt. 16 gr. [Inclosures are noted in the body of the letter.]

Liverpool to Wiscasset, District of Maine via Boston BOSTON - 1/2

May 9, 1794. Letter datelined at Liverpool and endorsed on face: p the Perserverance/ Captn Deland. Later "via Boston" was added.

The Perserverance is no doubt the 161 ton Ship Perserverance, built 1786 at York River, Virginia, the only ship so named before 1795 in the Holdcamper List.

October 23, 1794. French Revolution letterhead datelined at Brest in the Revolution style dating: le 2 Brumaire (fog month.) These months were named on a philosophical basis, such as Frimaire (sleet); Nivôse (snow): Ventôse (wind); Germinal (seed), etc. Letters bearing these dates may be found from November 24, 1793 to December 31, 1805.

This letter was handed to a ship's captain bound to the U.S.

March 7. Three Friends arrived at Boston.

This letter was handed to a ship's captain out of Marseilles and strife-torn revolutionary France. He in turn handed it to the captain of the Three Friends, which left Malaga on the southern coast of Spain about December 11, 1795. No other Boston arrivals are recorded from the area on these dates.

Letter rated, Act of 1792, 250 to 350 miles, Boston to Philadelphia plus 4¢ Ship Letter charge, or 20¢ + 4¢ = 24¢ as shown in the manuscript notation.

52 days from London would put the Thomas Russell's departure from London around Feb. 7, 1800. A legal letter, this was held for over 2 months after being written.

Letter rated under Act of March 2, 1799, only 28 days after these rates became effective. Not over 40 miles, Boston to Beverly, 8¢ plus 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 10¢.

This was the Act that established a 2¢ charge over ordinary postage for Ship Letters (except for letters addressed to the port of entry), previously the additional Ship Letter charge had been 4¢.

Dublin to Newburyport via Boston
Ship Venelia

April 10, 1800. Letter dated at Dublin (Ireland). The writer, Capt. Wm. Thomas complains, "I cant get no cash here. I must take Bills on London. Thear (sic) is no such thing as selling a bill in the Isle..." He is discharging his cargo and will sail as soon as he settles his account with Mr. Wilson.

April 21. Capt. Thomas had to wait for an "opportunity" to get his letter on board a ship bound to America. The ship <u>Venelia</u> sailed from Dublin on April 21.

The April 9 letter is endorsed: p favour of/Cap n J. G. Lathrop/Q.D.C. The latter is a talismanic inscription: Quam Deus Conservet = Whom God Preserve, wishing divine protection for the perils of the sea.

May 6. Schooner Elizabeth sailed from Bilboa.

Ship Harrah & Eliza

March 18, 1801. Prices current datelined at Leghorn (Livorno) and reference is made to the Blockade of Leghorn and all the ports of the Mediterranean "are declared in a state of Blockade" (by the British.) Napoleon's Campaigns in Italy during 1796-7 resulted in his establishing the Cisalpine Republic in Northern Italy. N.B.: By the signing of the Treaty of Amiens in 1802, France was again at peace for the first time since 1792, although the peace was to be short lived.

May 18, 1801. This letter was forwarded by private courier across Europe to Belfast, Ireland, where the firm of James Holmes & R. Davis added their note, "...many english houses had been necessitated to leave Leghorn by order of the existing government."

Holmes & Davis placed the letter aboard the ship Hannah & Eliza bound for Boston.

Cork. Ireland to Portland, District of Maine via Boston

March 16, 1801. Printed notice, an announcement regarding the establishment of an American commission business at Cork by John & George Newsom. Cover was endorsed, "p. Commerce/via Boston."



NEWRY, IRELAND TO NEW YORK VIA BOSTON Ship Fame, Capt. Lewis

August 15, 1801. A letter datelined at Newry concerns the shipment of meals and grains on Government account per four vessels, the Franklin, Resolution, Hantonia, and Rossconner. The cargos on the latter two vessels were much damaged due to improper stowage of the grain casks, and the meal became "sower." 300 casks in each vessel were so effected.





October 18, 1801. PORT OF BOSTON, Sunday. Last evening arrived the ship Fame, Capt. Lewis, 42 days from Liverpool. Spoke nothing.

Letter rated, Act of 1799, for a single letter 150 to 300 miles inland plus 2¢ Ship Letter charge, total 19¢ due, per manuscript notation.

August 19, 1801. A letter dated at London concerning various accounts. It also contains a duplicate letter of August 11 sent to Brown & Ives per the Peacock via New York. This letter is endorsed: P. Minerva/ Via Boston.





October 10. Minerva arrived at Boston. Letter rated, Act of 1799, single letter, Boston to Providence, zone of 40 to 90 miles, at 10¢ + 2¢ Ship Letter charge = 12¢ due.

St. Johns, Newfoundland to Frankfort, District of Maine, via Boston Sloop Dove, Capt. Lane

November 1, 1802. Letter is datelined at St. John (sic) and concerns the writer's establishment of a "scholl." It bears an interesting address: Capt. Lemuel Kempton

Capt. Lemuel Kempton Frankford

On Penobscot River Province of Maine In. Massachusetts Government.

He was referring to Frankfort on Marsh Stream, one mile west of the Penobscot River, 15 miles below Bangor. At that time Maine was the District of Maine, a part of Massachusetts (until 1820.)

August 14, 1805. A letter, in French, datelined at Madras. It is endorsed: by the Ship Aurora Cap. Coock/ for Boston. The ship Aurora of 294 tons was built in 1795 at Philadelphia.





They specifically recommend Maryland & Virginia tobaccos, Virginia Stems, cotton Georga Upland, rice White Havannah and Brazil Sugars.

This letter went under cover to a forwarding agent at Liverpool who endorsed it: p Milo/ to Boston.





March 27, 1818. The ship Milo sailed from Liverpool for Boston. The purser struck their unique (and desirable) SHIP MILO handstamp.



The letter deals with the mis-deeds of the writer's nephew, Jonathon Black, who apparently stole 9 dollars from his classmates at Wesleyan Acmdemy at N. Wilbraham, Mass. He asks the Rev. William Fisk to make restitution and charge to his brother's account. The letter indicates that Jonathan is headed home to Halifax and the tone of the letter would indicate that he is in big trouble.


