Captain on this voyage was John P. Smith, Liverpool Blue Swallowtail, '27 Napoleon, '36 Pennsylvanis.
Captain Smith was lost in January 1839, when the Pennsylvania hit a sandbank in the lower Mersey during the "Liverpool Hurricane" which swept the west coast of England. Of the 40 persons who had left Liverpool, 15 were lost including Capt. Smith.

She is reputed to have made the voyage from New York to Liverpool in twelve days, but also has the dubious record of the slowest westbound passage of 89 days, leaving L'pool Jan. 9, 1856, arrived New York April 7, 1856.





She was of 622 tons, 134"-8" x 32" beam with a hold depth of 16'. She was launched at New York in 1832 by Smith & Dimon. She was an average sailer, her westbound passages averaged 38 days, her shortest 24 days and longest 59 days.



The Canadian postmaster collected the U.S. postage necessary to get a letter prepaid to New York to meet one of the fast sailing American packets. Here this was shown by the unique red "U.S. POST PAID" handstamp and the "25" is the U.S. Act of 1825 rate for a single letter over 400 miles, Queenston to New York. The sender also had to pay the June 1, 1792, Canadian rate of 4½d. for a single letter not over 60 miles, Hamilton to the Exchange Office at Queenston plus a 2d. ferriage fee, total 6½d., as shown.

Then his mother would have to pay 1 shilling 8d. sterling for postage and captain's gratuity, Liverpool to Stranraer as well as the One Penny Post charge.







It was got off by throwing cargo overboard. Five crewmen, attempting to bring an anchor out in a small boat, were thrown into the surf when the boat capsized. They were rescued by throwing over to them hen coops until another boat could be launched. He says, "So that the only loss of lives were the loss of about 2 Dozen Hens which were in the coops..."

Her commander was William S. Sebor of Connecticut who skippered her through her entire service with the London Line. Capt. Sebor had one of the longest records of ocean packet command, from 1824 to 1850. His will was probated in October 1860.

Ship Columbus, 492 tons, was built by S. Wright at New York in 1821 and was registered Jan. 9, 1822 for the Black Ball Line which ran N.Y. to Liverpool. She was transferred to the Red Swallow-tail Line in 1827 and served that line until 1833 when she was condemned after a collision in the English Channel.

Captain on this voyage was Joseph Clement Delane (1796-1886) b. New Bedford, Mass., father Allerton, was brother of William Delano, Sr., great grandfather of Franklin Delano Roosevelt. He served aboard Columbia 1826 to 1833 when he transferred to Liverpool Swallowtail Roscoe in '33. He established a westbound speed record of 15 days, 18 hours from Portsmouth to Sandy Hook in the Columbia in '30.

May 26, 1827. Letter datelined at Washington City, written by Admiral William Bainbridge to William Aspinwall, U.S. Consul at London requesting plans and information on British Naval facilities. Letter in packet or by favor Washington to New York.

May 30, 1827. Ship Columbus, Delano master, cleared New York for London via Portsmouth.



Kingsbridge is on a sheltered harbor between Bolt Head and Prawle Point and was used occassionally as a harbor of refuge during severe weather. There are several Kingsbridge Ship Letter handstamps extant.

Letter went overland to London where it was subject to the 8d. Ship Letter rate, single, in effect since 1840.





July 15, 1839. Letter datelined at Chatteris and directionally endorsed "p private Ship / via London". It was backstamped with the unframed, undated circular stamp at Chatteris. Sender paid 1 shilling packet rate shown in red.







July 18-19. Transit tombstone and Paid Ship Letter merks at London. The ship Wellington, Capt. Chadwick, departed from London on July 27, 1839.
